## The Use of Articles with Nouns of Material

I. With nouns of material used in a <u>general</u> sense (the so-called "abstract concept") <u>no</u> article is used. (they are uncountable)

E.g. \( \mathcal{Q} \) Honey is wholesome. \( \mathcal{Q} \) Water boils at 100°C

- II. In other cases the article (indefinite/definite) is used according to the general rule.
  - **a / an:** 1. When they become countable:
    - a) denoting different sorts of material. E.g. <u>a</u> wine – wines ( ="one")
    - b) denoting helpings. E.g. <u>a</u> soup – 3 soups ( ="one")
    - 2. When they are modified by a <u>descriptive</u> attribute.

E.g. I'd like <u>a</u> Dutch cheese. It is <u>a</u> very good whisky.

- the:
  1. When they are modified by a <u>particularizing</u> attribute.
  E.g. <u>The</u> milk <u>in the glass</u> is mine. Don't touch it!
  - 2.. When the situation makes them definite.

E.g. She bought some bread. The bread turned out to be stale.

"Some" is often used when the indefinite part of the substance is meant.

E.g. She bought (some) cheese.

There is (some) milk in the bottle.
